South Hinksey Parish Council

The Annual Parish Meeting, held on 1 May provided a summary of the year's activities. It was a shame that not very many parishioners turned out, but the minutes of the meeting can be found on the Parish Council pages of the website: www.southhinksey.org. There have been changes in personnel during the year: Tom Barron and Elizabeth Halcro, both very active Councillors, resigned. Sandra Bingham has joined the Council; a replacement for Tom is being sought.

The Council made **grants** to the Village Hall for general running expenses and Stepping Stones pre-school group for new play equipment.

Current concerns: The perennial issues of safety on the A34 and Hinksey Hill were covered, as were: a proposed new railway bridge, the future of the General Elliot pub, the Village Hall and flooding.

Environmental topics included the wildflower meadow; the Community Woodland next to the Garden Centre road and use of the Old Car Park as community land. There was also a report from the Parochial Church Council and information about the new-look South Hinksey website. Several of these topics are covered elsewhere in this edition of the Echo.

Overbridge work

Way back in February, the work on the bridge over the A34 was done in the immediate aftermath of the burst water main and flooding at the top of the village. It made for interesting times and access during the day was very difficult for a couple of days. The bridge doesn't look any different, but I'm assured that the work was completed successfully.

Footbridge over the railway

Network Rail (NR) plan to raise this bridge 'before Christmas', as part of the electrification of the line. We are trying to see if it can be made to be buggy, bicycle and wheelchair friendly in the process. It seems unlikely that NR will fund this. At the time of writing we are waiting to hear back from them: they have been very slow to respond, even to a letter from Nicola Blackwood MP.

Depending on NR's reply we can involve others, including Andrew Smith, MP, District, City and County Councils (preliminary contacts already made with District and City), as necessary. We will also consider a petition, and publicity via the local media. Updates will follow on Shinfo.

Village Hall

Flooding News

An abnormally dry winter meant that there was no significant flooding from the river. To make up for this, the top of the village flooded in February when a very large old water main in Parker Road burst early one morning, cutting off the village from the rest of the world for the rest of the day. Half a dozen houses were damaged and repairs are still ongoing.



The Sloppy Gardener is sad to have to report that since February’s burst water main the garden has suffered not from benign neglect but from almost total desertion. We go back from time to time and Jo mows the lawn, which has an instant effect. Most of our perennials survived, though some are a bit sorry for themselves. I’ve scattered a few packets of annual seeds among the flower beds and that will have to do for this year I’m afraid. We miss the garden and hope to be back at the end of August.

The New Website

The website: southhinksey.org has changed, as many of you will have noticed. The website came into being as part of the Parish Plan in 2004. The idea was to improve communications in a community divided by the A34, where it could be difficult for everyone to know what was going on. I found myself editing the website, while Dave Markham

looked after the technical side. David Rawcliffe has volunteered to take it over and has given it a makeover while keeping just about all of the original content. The website has always been independently owned and is not part of the Parish Council. It retains that independence. Saint Laurence Church

Report to the South Hinksey Parish Council AGM 2012



St Laurence continues to have a weekly Sunday service at 9.15am; this is mainly a service from Common Worship (the CofE's modern prayer book) and is Morning Prayer on the first Sunday of the month and a Eucharist for the other Sundays. On the fifth Sunday of the month the service is Holy Communion from the Book of Common Prayer. There are usually well known hymns.

We are lucky to have the help of Fr Richard Smail who takes services as well as the Priest in Charge. We are also blessed with Wilbur Wright playing the organ on most Sundays.

The main highlight of the year is the Patronal festival of St Laurence on or around the time of his feast, 10 August. This is usually part of a Gift Day when we try and raise money towards the upkeep of our ancient building. The congregation from New Hinksey come over to St Laurence for a procession and service and we also have a bring-and-share lunch on the vicarage lawn after the service.

The real challenge for St Laurence Church at the moment is the continuation of a weekly Sunday service. The numbers of people attending church are perilously low and the Church Council is discussing the future earnestly. The majority of those who worship on a Sunday come from outside the village, having historic or family connections.

The building is in excellent repair, having had much work done in recent years. We are very grateful for the financial help the Parish Council has given us over the years. Recently the newly created toilet and kitchenette extension has greatly enhanced the life of the church. We are looking forward to the installation and blessing of a memorial in memory of Fr John Davis who was Vicar for twenty years.

We continue to have baptisms, weddings and funerals for villagers, people from Hinksey Hill or New Hinksey as well as those with historic or family connections.

In the summer we have the church open for tea and chat, do watch out for posters advertising the Sundays that we will be open this summer.

Important for all patients

Thames Valley Primary Care Agency (TVPCA) are currently carrying out a number of exercises to check and validate patient data. If you receive a letter from them to check data please ensure that you respond or they may remove you from the practice list. If you find yourself removed you will need to re-register. This is something that the TVPCA are carrying out across the whole of the county and it is beyond our control. Please ask to speak to the Practice Manager if you have any concerns with this.

Telephone consultations

We now offer telephone consultations for each GP when they are in work. These give access to a GP if you feel you cannot wait until the next available routine appointment. They are NOT a second best response but provide contact with a GP who can give you advice and reassurance, start you on medication or call you in to see you. The feedback we get from patients who are using this option is very positive.

Cancelling appointments

We are aware that things happen that may mean you cannot attend for a pre-arranged appointment. Please help us to reduce the number of no shows by calling us and cancelling your appointment. We are then able to offer these appointments to other patients waiting to see a GP.

Prescriptions

We are only able to accept requests for repeat prescriptions over the phone from patients over the age of 65 or who are housebound. Please use our e-mail link on the website or drop off your requests at the surgery. If we are closed please put it through the letter box and it will be processed within 48 hours from the NEXT WORKING DAY.

Community notice board

You will be aware that we allow community organisations to use the notice board in the waiting room to display appropriate material. Please contact the Practice Manager if you wish to book a month and display something.

Please remember that the Practice Manager is always willing to discuss any matters concerning the practice with you. Call around to his office, catch him if you see him walking around or ask a receptionist if you can speak to him.

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
